

De Kalb, October 17<sup>th</sup> 1815

To Isaac Cooper Esquire, Coopertown

Dear Sir,

The bearer Mr. E. Botsford has a title to 7 acres of lands as you will see by the deed signed by Samuel Millington. While I was at Bangor I conversed with Mr. Joseph Keeler with respect to Mr. Botsford's claim & etc. He told me that he had bought the whole lot of Mr. Millington without any reserves & if Mr. Botsford had not received his pay it must be due from Millington. However he had sold 31 acres to Mr. Daniel Skidmore, which included the 7 acres above mentioned.

Skidmore had brought on a carding machine to set up on said lot & intended to erect clothier works & etc. which would be of material consequence to the place & that he would rather pay Mr. Botsford's demand himself than Mr. Skidmore should be frustrated or disappointed with respect to the lot he had sold him. & He should endeavor to have the business settled. Mr. Skidmore was willing to pay forty dollars, which I received & gave him a receipt to be applied toward the payment of 31 acres bought of Joseph Keeler & lying in the N. E. corner of Lot No. 36 said Keeler Farm. Which I suppose will include the above 7 acres. You will therefore please to make it right between them as it is in your power & also endeavor to accommodate Mr. Skidmore. I have just returned from Bangor & have not had time make out the map & field Book etc. but will endeavor to prepare & forward them the next mail together with every statement I think you may wish to know.
