

New York September 5th 1816

Dr. Sir,

I regret exceedingly your long and severe indisposition, and to it, I ascribe my not seeing You when in town, some short time since; particularly, as I had some communications to make, which I have lately come in possession of and which I am desirous to arrange immediately. In answer to a letter to W.J. Averill, Jr. I am informed by him, that he has paid you, not only for the larger lot of 900 acres but also for my Lot No. 106 containing 196 acres, bought March 20, 1809 at \$4 50/100 and on which, the interest has been regularly paid on what was due and that the balance was paid you in Sept. last, I have no doubt that in consequence of your illness you were unconscious that you were receiving and receipting for large sums of mine, otherwise it could not to have occurred without my assent? Hereunto I have subjoined an acct.
