A young man with a pair of loaded revolvers created a lively scene on a trolley car coming from the State hospital Monday night. Motorman Jesse Aust requested him to go inside the car and the stranger replied by pulling two old fashioned Colt pistols, each fully loaded, and poking them under Aust's nose with the injunction that he himself was boss of the car. In the scuffle the man either fell or jumped from the car and the motorman thinking he had been hurt backed up to look for him.
