# INF. PARALYSIS CLAIMS MAN OF 31 YEARS

Brother of Glenn Haven, of  
 Ogdensburg, Ill but 3  
 1918 Hours.

Gouverneur, Aug. 31.—Grover Haven, brother of Glenn Haven of Ogdensburg, died at seven o'clock this evening at his home here from infantile paralysis following a short and tragic illness.

Mr. Haven, who was 31 years old and for the past twelve years or more had been employed by the C. B. Collins Hardware Company in the capacity of plumber, had not been feeling well for the last two or three days. At four o'clock this afternoon he felt so ill that Dr. Sayer was called in, and the latter immediately perceived symptoms of paralysis. Dr. Sayer could not stay with his patient, however, owing to other duties, but called in Dr. Close to watch the case.

The sufferer's condition, notwithstanding all possible medical treatment, grew steadily worse, until death intervened at seven thirty o'clock. The breathing muscles were completely paralyzed.

Mr. Haven was a member of the Gouverneur band, which was conducting a concert at the time of his death. Upon receipt of the sad news, however, the entertainment was immediately discontinued. Mr. Haven's mother, who lives at Dekalb, arrived here tonight, and besides her the deceased leaves a wife and a five-month's old daughter, as well as his brother in Ogdensburg, to mourn his loss.

Retired Farmer of Gouverneur Had Been in Failing Health for a Year.

Gouverneur, Jan. 4.—James Alvah Whitton, 74, 45 McKean street, long a farmer in this area, died at his home Monday afternoon at 5:30. He had been failing health for the past year.

Funeral services will be held at the home Thursday afternoon at 1, Rev. Harold A. Thomas, pastor of the First Methodist church, officiating. Interment will be in Riverside cemetery.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Leone Whitton, and three daughters, Mrs. Fred (Bessie) McIntyre of Richville, Mrs. Ver-gill (Mary) Stowell of Dekalb and Mrs. Everett (Hazel) Tomlinson of Route 3, Gouverneur. Three sons, Arnold and Glenn Whitton, both of Route 3, Gouverneur and Franklin Whitton of Natural Dam; nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren. One brother, George Whitton Pompey, and a sister, Mrs. Margaret Whitmore of Gouverneur.

Mr. Whitton was born in town of Gouverneur on Jan. 20, 1869, a son of Robert and Hannah Adams Whitmore. The father was born at Melrose, Scotland, and came to this country when he was 18.

The younger Mr. Whitton was married twice. His first wife was Mary Brice of Dekalb whom he married Nov. 25, 1891, in a ceremony performed by the late Rev. William F. Skinner of the Presbyterian church in Gouverneur. She died in March of 1898.

He married Leona McIntyre of Richville at Oxbow on Jan. 1, 1906, Rev. S. T. Angel officiating. Prior to moving to this village in 1936 he operated farms at Richville, Dekalb and on the Island branch road near Hailesboro.
